Ram Lal Anand College was founded in the year 1964 by late Shri Ram Lal Anand, a senior advocate in the supreme court of India, in response to the growing social demand in the sixties for providing educational opportunities at the university level. The college was initially managed by the Ram Lal Anand Trust. It was later taken over by the University of Delhi. Since 1973, it has been run by the University of Delhi as a University Maintained Institution.



The college is located in the picturesque surroundings against the backdrop of the Aravalli ranges in the neighbourhood of the south campus of the University of Delhi and several other educational institutions. It has a vast campus, spread over ten acres of land with green lawns and elegant buildings of much sprawling architectural merit. The college has excellent infrastructure, with the state-of-the-art laboratories, seminar room, amphitheatre, library, playground and cafeteria. The campus is Wi-Fi enabled. Being in a multi-disciplinary, co-educational institution it has approximately 2500 students pursuing different courses in Arts, Commerce and Science streams. The Department of Political Science at Ram Lal Anand College is engaging its students in getting first-hand experience through debates, dialogues, symposiums, national level seminars and through research. The teaching and research programme of the Department is based on a comprehensive social science approach that integrates and interrogates sociological, political, economic, philosophical and cultural dimensions. THE CONCEPT

Course Overview:

Participants will analyze global trends and contemporary issues such as conflicts, trade wars, and the US-China rivalry. The course also focuses on developing strategic thinking and policy analysis skills, enabling participants to assess foreign policy decisions and their global implications. Practical skills in diplomatic communication and policy-making processes are emphasized, preparing individuals to navigate the complexities of international diplomacy and strategy.

Mission:

Our mission is to equip participants with the knowledge and skills required to influence and navigate the global political arena effectively. By fostering a thorough understanding of international relations and foreign policy, we prepare individuals for meaningful roles in global governance and diplomacy. Our goal is to nurture informed and strategic thinkers capable of contributing to a more stable, just, and peaceful world.

Importance and Need for the Course:

In today's interconnected world, understanding international relations and foreign policy is crucial for addressing global challenges. Globalization has created a complex web of interactions that require careful management and informed decision-making. Issues such as climate change, terrorism, and pandemics demand coordinated international responses. Enhancing diplomatic and strategic skills is essential for effective negotiation and conflict resolution. Additionally, the course offers valuable career opportunities in diplomacy, international organizations, and policy analysis. It also fosters informed citizenship by developing critical thinking and global awareness, contributing to peace and security through effective policy formulation and advocacy.

Methodology:

Our course employs a variety of teaching methods to ensure a comprehensive learning experience. Interactive online lectures will delve into theoretical frameworks, global security, and international political economy. Case studies, such as the Cuban Missile Crisis and Brexit, will provide real-world context to theoretical knowledge.
