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# **<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>**

# **1.1 INTRODUCTION**

Ramjas College is situated in Delhi's northern ridge in the lap of the Aravalli Mountain range. As among the oldest institutions of Delhi University, the college has been serving the nation since its foundation on 17 January 1917 by the great educationist and philanthropist Lala Rai Kedar Nath in the memory of his father Lala Ramjas Mal. The original premises were in Daryaganj, after which the foundation stone of the college was laid by Mahatma Gandhi at a hillock called Kala Pahad in 1924, which later came to be called as Anand Parbat. After the handing over of Anand Parbat to the British Army for military use during World War II, Ramjas College was relocated to its present location in the year 1950. This new building was inaugurated in 1951 by Dr. Rajendra Prasad, the first president of India. The College also takes pride in having been associated with Dr. B. R. Ambedkar, the chief architect of the Indian Constitution, who adorned the Governing Body of this institution. The students of Ramjas College joined the Indian independence movement and actively participated in the Quit India Movement of 1942. The college also played a key role in several new initiatives at the university level such as the conception of the idea leading to the formation of Staff Council as a statutory body in all affiliated colleges of Delhi University. This renowned temple of learning for the period covering more than a century holds credit for making leaders who have left their imprints in different spheres of life. The college maintains an efficient academic ecosystem by harnessing huge potentials of human resources of the students, faculties and non-teaching staff. This has helped in creating a healthy teaching-learning environment in the pursuit of knowledge.

The college at present offers a variety of courses to the students at undergraduate and postgraduate levels in all three streams (science, arts and commerce); along with other certificate and diploma courses in foreign languages.

## **1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)**

### Institutional Strength

- Favourable location, very near to Vishwavidyalaya Delhi Metro, with good connectivity of other modes of transportation.
- Experienced, well-trained and dedicated teachers to help carry the baton of institutional success to scale new heights.
- Hostel accommodation within campus for boys and girls.
- Well-maintained, web-based Students Information Services (SIS) for management of student related data like attendance, assignments and internal assessment.
- Academic Standards Committee (ASC), a duly constituted Staff Council Committee having convenors from each stream, Science, Arts & Commerce; and a member representative from each department.
- Student-Faculty Committee (SFC) at the department level, something unique in the college. All grievances pertaining to academics are addressed and resolved amicably and with mutual cooperation in the SFC.
- State-of-the-art research centre namely Harsh Malhotra Research Centre for students and teachers.
- The college has developed infrastructure, which includes well-equipped auditorium, conference hall, seminar room, lecture and tutorial rooms, laboratories, hygienic cafeteria, common room for girl students, hostels for boys and girls, sports ground, shooting range, well maintained lawns with a diversity of trees and shrubs contributing to the green cover of our campus area, a herbal/medicinal garden, a well-designed parking space, a photocopy centre and a stationary shop.
- In terms of environmental development and its sensitivity, the college has developed a water replenishment system, and a well defined provision of solar energy.
- To overcome linguistic and cultural barriers, the college runs modern language courses through its School of Foreign and Indian Languages (SFIL).
- The strength of an academic institution lies with cementing the bond with students belonging to its past and the present. In this direction, the college has an Alumni Association Centre.
- The active IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell), which encourages and promotes the overall academic environment in the college.

- Presence of Ramjas College Alumni Association to help build the spirit of mutual trust and the attachment with the alma mater Ramjas College.
- Disabled-friendly campus with ramps, double footsteps, tactile paths and special washroom.

### Institutional Weakness

- Infrastructure Bottlenecks: In previous years, given the different admission procedures, at times, there used to be over or under admission as compared to the sanctioned strength in many of the courses offered by the college. This led to a distorted teachers-student ratio, and hence impacted the teaching learning process of the college. Since the system is changed now since 2022, based on the CUET, this very problem is automatically resolved to a great extent, leading to a lesser number of over or under admissions in most of the categories of the courses.
- For many years, there were no permanent appointments taking place; this adversely affected the teaching-learning process in terms of an unstable academic atmosphere. With the ongoing permanent appointments of staff of teaching and non-teaching, the academic standards of the college have significantly improved.
- The recent EWS expansion has distorted the student-teacher ratio', thus affecting the academic environment by putting pressure on infrastructural constraints. This however will be eased out upon the receipt of grants in lieu of EWS expansion.
- The college is in dire need of a research support system to help teachers and students to carry out their research work. Now since the promotion is directly linked to publication, paper-presentation, projects, etc. it thus becomes imperative to have a state of the art research infrastructure.
- Dedicated space for seminars and conferences is an integral part of academics in any academic institute. For quite some time, Ramjas College is facing acute demand for these facilities; the given spaces are falling short of demand. Quite expectedly, the problem will be solved with the availability of the fifth floor in the new building, which has dedicated spaces for this purpose.
- There is an urgent need for audio/video studios, a pre-requisite for the changing demand of academics as per the NEP.
- The engagement of parents on a vibrant scale would prove beneficial in many ways. Their involvement may help improve students' behaviour and achievements, and also foster connections between the institution and society at large.

### **Institutional Opportunity**

• The curriculum under the National Educational Policy, 2020 has value addition courses in store for us, which would provide an opportunity for students to enhance their ability and skill to face the personal and professional challenges. The popularity of Value addition courses like Constitutional Values and

Fundamental Duties, Ayurveda and Nutrition, Ethics and Culture, as observed amongst students, would not only empower youth with essential attributes of logic, reasoning, analytical-thinking, but also foster values, humility, ethics, empathy, honesty, integrity, compassion, courage, resilience, as well as a sense of responsibility towards the Nation.

- Skill-based courses on computer skills, effective communication, IT and finance have been introduced to provide students with hands-on experience for the real world
- The ICT based courses including MOOC and other such avenues will present a bouquet of courses to choose from for students as per their interest.
- This use of technology, in accordance with the needs of present-day pupils, will open doors to different strata of society, thus promoting inclusive education. This will also enable them to address the problems of the contemporary world in an efficient manner.
- The college through its outreach activities and extension plans also provides opportunities to students and staff members to participate and connect to society, collaborate with industries, government and non-government organisations for holistic development.
- Various societies and forums including the Literary Society, Debating Society, Quiz Society, Theatre Society, Dance Society, Music Society, Fine Arts Society, Film and Photography Society, NSS, NCC, Enabling Unit, SC/ST Cell, Northeast Cell, Women Development Centre, Career Development Cell, Ramjas Model United Nations (TRMUN), Global Youth Forum, Enactus etc. encourage students to reach out at national level and globally to prove and showcase their skills and talent.

### Institutional Challenge

- Resource constraints pose a major challenge to the institution. The changes in course curriculum and pedagogy to approach effective production and dissemination of knowledge demand adequate funds and infrastructure. For the successful run of the National Education Policy, the financial stress needs a sustainable resolution.
- With the changes around the corner, we must prepare for creating, designing and developing new courses in the interest of students. The devising of the same requires special grants in order to prepare course materials. Such a support system is also vital for teachers which would encourage them to publish their works.
- Yet another challenge, in aiming to achieve the NEP vision, is to make available the reading material in Hindi for students who have chosen this language as their medium of study. Teachers do put up their best to communicate in their interest through measures such as remedial classes but the lack of enough resources for translation works of essential and suggested readings limits the effort. The same situation prevails for students with other Indian languages as their medium of learning.
- To balance between the research component as an integral part of career advancement and the quality teaching to serve the interest of interest is an important issue to be dealt with by a faculty. In order to manage both these activities, the institution has to continuously develop the facilities as required in its

premises in order to save time and energy.

- Fostering collaboration between academia and industry is crucial for driving innovation and it is imperative to facilitate opportunities for researchers and students to work in industry settings through internship and fellowship programs.
- The popular societal perception of education as solely a means to a job carried right from the early stage of education creates a mismatch between the purpose of learning as conveyed at school and university levels including even higher education at large. The duel between the teacher merely as an information provider and the faculty as a knowledge producer becomes inevitable. Hence with the changing objectives and scheme of teaching-learning, the equilibrium between the different layers of education is desideratum.

## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

### **Curricular Aspects**

- The college offers a **wide range of courses** dealing with core disciplines, generic elective papers, skill enhancement and value-added courses.
- **Teaching plan for each paper** is prepared by faculties while adhering to the academic calendar. This also enables the students to organise their study and learn time management.
- The division of a class into **tutorial and practical groups** facilitates interaction for a better understanding of the subjects and hands-on experience.
- Extra classes and remedial classes, especially to help students from the marginalised/weaker sections of society, are arranged and readings for the papers are provided to students.
- Educational tours and field trips are also organised to encourage experiential learning.
- The **continuous and comprehensive evaluation system** for all courses covers the activities which help wholesome development of students. This method of assessment includes presentations, assignments, projects, group discussions, etc. which enable students to realise their potential and enhance skills. The paper-wise internal assessment of students including evaluation of attendance, assignments, class tests, practicals, etc., uploaded on the faculty portal on the college website, is accessible to students through the student portal.
- The **mentoring sessions** enable the students to identify the issues in their routine, career prospects, etc., and prepare for a better future.
- The **Student-Faculty Committee meetings** are held in departments wherein matters pertaining to teaching-learning are discussed and solutions for betterment are reached.
- All departments of the college under the aegis of Internal Quality Assurance Cell also organise lectures, seminars/webinars, workshops and conferences which elevate the levels of academic and

research skills. The students also participate in varieties of extracurricular activities and various games and sports events conducted in the college as well as in other institutions. These help them **develop the spirit of discipline, unity and cooperation, improve physical ability and skills, and emerge as dutiful citizens.** 

#### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

- Ramjas College offers wide range of UG, PG course under UGCF NEP 2020. The college adheres to the curriculum and guidelines adopted by the university through its statutory bodies.
- The college follows **Government of India reservation policy** during the admission process of students and faculty recruitment. We also admit the students from Physically handicapped, Kashmiri migrants, war widows, Sports, foreign categories as per the criteria fixed by University of Delhi.
- Besides the regular UG and PG courses, we also offer certificate, diploma, advanced diploma in foreign languages and various add-on courses.
- Since the inception of NEP 2020, college focusses on **Outcome-Based teaching-learning pedagogy**. To align with the changing education system, our faculty members keep themselves updated via faculty development programmes, conferences, workshops, seminars.
- The college is well equipped with ICT enabled class rooms/laboratories, audio-video aids to visually impaired students.
- Being a constituent college, we adhere to the guidelines adopted by the university regarding the internal assessment. The **continuous and comprehensive evaluation system** for all courses covers the activities which help wholesome development of students. Lectures, tutorials, practicals and internal assessment are conducted as per the academic calendar of the university.
- College statutory bodies like Academic standard committee, Student faculty committee ensures the proper implementation of the Delhi university guidelines.
- The college provides **ample opportunities to students** for regular interaction with well-known names from academia and industries. Our robust feedback system helps to identify our strength and lacunae as well. This process, thus helps us in eliminating our weaknesses and appropriate planning to overcome obstacles.
- Collective efforts of all stake holders: students, faculties, non-teaching, Governing body reflects in placements. Our students not only excel in govt and corporate world but also contributing in entrepreneurship. Huge list of well-placed Ramjas Alumni authenticates the outcome-based learning approach followed by our institutions.

#### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

• Ramjas College is actively involved in research, innovations, and extension activities.

**Research grants of over 170 lakhs** were arranged by the departments of college from differtent agencies. These include Department of Biotechnology, Government of India; Nehru Memorial Museum and Library, Teen Murti; University of Delhi; Science & Engineering Research Board, Department of Science & Technology, Government of India; Indian Council of Philosophical Research; Institute of Eminence, University of Delhi; and Ministry of Fisheries, Animal Husbandry and Dairying, Department of Animal Husbandry and Dairying.

- Further, **Research Incubation Centres** have been set up for undertaking theoretical and applied research such as Fungal Biology Research Lab and Molecular Biology and Genomics Research Lab (Zoology), Medicinal Plant Research Lab (Botany), Animal Husbandry and Dairying (Chemistry) and Dr. Harsh Malhotra Research Center.
- Star College Scheme (2011-2020) in departments of Botany, Chemistry, Physics and Zoology, and Star College status was granted to Physics and Zoology departments (2017-2020).
- Several publications are made in Scopus-indexed, UGC Care listed and UGC-approved national and international journals.
- Ramjas College spends a wholesome amount on **innovation-related activities**. Various community outreach programmes like gender sensitization, blood donation camps, and environmental and health awareness campaigns are conducted through the National Service Scheme, Eco Club and Gender Sensitisation Committee. Placement Cell organises various talks about the practical aspects of entering the job industry.
- In Enactus, Ramjas students are involved in many projects in partnership with various Government and Non-Government organisations. Many of these projects have received national as well as international accolades and laurels. As a result, many of our students/ex-students have successfully launched their own start-ups. Further, Project Swabun, an initiative towards better sanitation and waste management practices that came in the top 4 at the Enactus World Cup, is an attempt to work against water, land and air pollution through composting. Project Bawarchi solves the problem of food security while providing rehabilitation to victims of substance abuse. Project Transcreations aims to uplift transgenders socially and financially by running beauty salons by transgenders. This is how innovations made by Ramjas College students are extending for the benefit of society.

### Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The heritage building of the college with its added new structures equipped with essential facilities, provide an **ideal atmosphere for teaching, research and conducting outreach programmes**.
- The institution is gifted with a **spacious campus**, **state-of-the-art infrastructure**, **dedicated faculty and non-teaching staff** marching together towards integrating the principles, values and practices of sustainable development into all aspects of teaching and learning.
- The college provides diverse forms of opportunities to students through **various clubs and societies** in order to enhance their knowledge and skills, reach excellence in different fields, and achieve all-round development.

- The classrooms are provided with projectors and other technological set-ups which help in powerpoint presentations, screening of documentaries/movies, etc. The platforms such as Google Classroom, Google Meet, Internet Archive, Library Genesis, YouTube, Google earth/Google maps, virtual heritage walks etc. were used by the faculties and students for interaction and gaining information during the corona-virus pandemic period.
- There are **Computer labs** attached with various departments of the college.
- The **well-maintained library of the college** has an online cataloguing system which provides easy access to all the available books including rare collections and digital resources. The Braille Section houses Braille books and digital devices to serve the interests of visually challenged students.
- Technologically advanced auditorium, seminar halls, conference centre, and Committe rooms in the college facilitates organization of academic events.
- The college provides **hostel facilities** within the campus for boys and girls.
- The institution has **well maintained grounds** for various games and sports. In addition there is a **Gymnasium** for the use by students and staff.
- A well equipped medical room with facility for physiotherapy, and counselling room is available in the college premise.
- The ECA room and amphitheatre provides space for performing arts.
- A properly managed **canteen service** in the college and **a pantry in the staffroom** helps in **promoting healthy eating habits**.

### **Student Support and Progression**

- The college possesses a **well-established**, **indigenous**, **web-based Students Information Services** (SIS) that ensures transparency, accuracy and ease of management of student related data like attendance, assignments and internal assessment. The students are encouraged to get issued their login ID/password (for SIS) immediately after admission.
- Ramjas College is dedicated to provide **maximum support to students in their academic and professional endeavours**. Students regularly receive various Government, Non-Government scholarships and fee-concessions. College also provides **financial aid to needy and eligible students** every year.
- Various programs are continuously organised in college that **enhance soft skills**, **language and communication**, life skills and ICT/computing skills, which prepare them in pursuing their professional goals.
- Various career advancement activities including placement, career counselling and guidance for competitive examinations are organised to give direction to their career prospects.

- **Students' grievances are also addressed** through appropriate bodies like, the Internal Complaints Committee against Sexual Harassment, Anti-ragging Committee, Discipline Committee, Grievance Committee, Student Advisory Committee and Academic Standards Committee.
- The college has a **well established placement and training cell**, for guiding students towards a better career.
- Students are important stakeholders of any academic institution. College provides many opportunities to ensure their representation and participation in various student bodies and committees under duly established processes and norms. The **Student Advisory Committee** organises Students' Union elections every year. The **IQAC also includes student representatives** to ensure students' participation in its activities and policy making. In each department and student-societies, office bearers are elected amongst students for smooth functioning of activities.
- To enable holistic growth of students, the college provides several opportunities to display their talents and skills in the field of sports and cultural activities, to enable holistic growth of students. **Students represent the college and the university in many inter-college and inter-university activities** and bring awards. Many students represent the college and earn glory at National and International levels.
- The college has an active **Alumni association** that facilitates alumni engagement and support in the form of scholarship, motivation, guidance and opportunities for the current students. Recently, the college has developed a research centre also with the financial aid provided by alumni.

### Governance, Leadership and Management

- The vision and mission of Ramjas College is reflected in the motto 'Gyanat Partaram Nahi' ('Knowledge has no comparison.') that illuminates our commitment to cultivate and uphold knowledge. The principles of decentralisation and participative management are seen through allocation of authority and responsibilities to office bearers such as Principal, Vice Principal, IQAC, Bursar, PIO, Liaison Officer, Administrative and Section Officers, Staff Council and Student Union.
- The use of **ICT and e-governance** also help us to achieve our objectives. We look forward to a future cultivated by the vision enshrined in the NEP 2020 with its focus on fruitful teaching-learning for the holistic development of students.
- The institution has effective welfare measures and Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression. The college provides Ward Quota facility, Children Education Allowance, medical reimbursement, Leave Travel Concession (LTC) and Home Travel Concession (HTC), Facilities

such as air-conditioned staff room, administrative wing and committee room; a well-furnished kitchenette within the staff room and the college canteen serve as important spaces beyond the classrooms.

- Seminars, workshops, lecture series, conferences, talks, training programmes and Faculty Development Programmes (FDPs) for the staff are regularly organized by Ramjas College for **enriching the academic environment and keep pace with upgraded techniques**.
- Ramjas College ensures **proper utilisation of resources and grants** from various government/nonnovernment agencies. ### Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	Ramjas college facilitates the exchange of ideas in order to instill creative and critical thinking among students for their all-round development enabling them to emerge as leaders in diverse fields. Our goal is to ensure the continuous flow of streams that would nurture the growth of sustainable thoughts to lead a meaningful life. Academic flexibility and multidisciplinary approach under the NationalEducational Policy 2020 (NEP 2020) is reflected in the Undergraduate Curriculum Framework (UGCF) adopted by the University of
	Framework (UGCF) adopted by the University of Delhi with features such as multiple entry and exits
	of students in courses and inclusion of papers focusing on learning outcomes relevant in present

	world. The multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary approach to teaching-learning is nurtured and developed through offering choice of inter- departmental courses like Generic Elective (GE) papers taught by all departments, for which the preferences is sought from students through the students' portal, prior to the commencement of each academic session/semester. GE papers are provide exposure to various disciplines besides the core course chosen by the students. The choice of Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) papers is also provided within the Department for Honours Courses and inter- department for Programme Courses. The curriculum under the NEP 2020 includes Value Added Courses (VAC) which provide opportunity for students to enhance their ability and skills to face the personal and professional challenges. Furthermore, the ICT based courses including MOOC and other such avenues will present bouquet of courses to choose from for students in order to equip them with required skills. The use of technology, in accordance with the need of present day pupils, will open doors to different strata of society, thus, promoting inclusive education. This will also enable them to address the problems of the contemporary world in efficient manner. Each Department conducts its own orientation programmes to acquaint students of the various aspects of thee papers enabling them to make proper choice as per their interest.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	An Academic Bank of Credit under the NEP has been established in order to digitally store the academic credits earned by students from various recognized Higher Education Institutions (HEIs). Ramjas College has released a step-by-step user guide on its website to help students for systematic generation of IDs across diverse platforms like DIGILOCKER, ABC portal, UMANG, etc. for digitization of academic records like degrees, certificates, mark- sheets, and the credits accumulated. The ABC facilitates academic flexibility to students in the scheme of multiple entry and exits during the course of a chosen programme under the NEP 2020. As recommended, Certificate will be awarded to students who exit at the end of the first year after successfully fulfilling the academic requirements. Diploma shall be awarded if the student exits at the end of the

	second year. The students would earn a Degree after the completion of three years and the Degree with Research after four years of study. Students shall be permitted to rejoin the program even after a gap to pursue a higher qualification. This enables a student to plan his academic journey for obtaining the require credits for a Certificate/Diploma/Degree and an opportunity for lifelong learning. Furthermore, the depository will also provide opportunities to students for attending the courses of their choice in other institutions and earn credits for designing their own degree. This will make the process of credit transfer form one institution to another, either at national or international level, efficient.
3. Skill development:	Ramjas College ensures the maintenance of a healthy environment for growth of teaching-learning activities with emphasis on critical, innovative, and analytical thinking along with skill development. The college is committed to imparting skills to students in order to acquire level of competency in accordance with the objectives of the National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF) introduced by Government of India in 2013. The institution offers a wide range of courses dealing with core disciplines, generic elective papers, skill enhancement and value-addition courses under the National Educational Policy 2020, which would equip students with better understanding of the professional ethics and human values to face the personal and professional challenges. Skill Enhancement Courses (SECs) currently offered by the college include courses on Sustainable Tourism, E-Tourism, Communication, Creative Writing, IT Tools, Digital Marketing, Entrepreneurship Development, Sericulture, etc. In addition, the Value Addition Courses (VACs) dealiong with Constitutional Values and Fundamental Duties, Ayurveda and Nutrition, Ethics and Culture, would not only empower youth with essential attributes of logic, reasoning, analytical-thinking, but also foster values, ethics, integrity, courage, as well as a sense of responsibility towards the Nation. To develop interdisciplinary approach in learning and to enhance skills among students, Ramjas College also runs several add-on courses which include certificate and diploma courses in foreign languages. The college through its outreach activities and extension plans, such as the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan towards creating

	awareness and sensitivity towards uplifting of the underprivileged sections of society, also provides opportunities to students and staff members to participate and connect to society, collaborate with industries, government and non-government organisations for holistic development. Various societies and forums including the Literary Society, Debating Society, Quiz Society, Theatre Society, Dance Society, Music Society, Fine Arts Society, Film and Photography Society, NSS, NCC, Enabling Unit, SC/ST Cell, Northeast Cell, Women Development Centre, Career Development Cell, Ramjas Model United Nations (TRMUN), Global Youth Forum, Enactus etc. encourage students to reach out at national level and globally to prove their skills and talent.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Ramjas College is committed to promoting multilingualism, fostering regional languages, and mother tongue. The college library houses a rich collection of books, journals and e-resources on Indian Knowledge System and our literary traditions through the ages. There are a number of initiatives at the college in this regard. To begin with, the college follows the course and syllabus of the University focussing the NEP. As part of structure, a number of papers under SEC and VAC are being offered that includes Ayurveda and Nutrition, Vedic mathematics, E-Tourism, Yoga Philosophy and Practice, Ethic and Culture, etc. that fosters classroom learning in a bilingual mode (English and Hindi). Several workshops and seminars are organized on topics pertaining to Sanskrit Literary Traditions, Hindi Language Enhancement, and Letter Writing in Regional Languages and celebration of various Indian festivals focusing on enhancing Indian knowledge system in the form of different culture. Further, at the college level, sincere efforts are initiated to make available the reading material in Hindi for students who have chosen Hindi language as their optional medium of study. This is particularly important for students belonging to Arts and Commerce. Teachers at the college are putting in the best of their efforts in the form of residual classes and mentor mentee session to make the Indian knowledge relevant from the present perspective. In this regard, it is worth mentioning, to communicate in the vernacular and Indian language like India and

	Sanskrit, while taking such measures (remedial classes or mentor-mentee ship session), lack of enough resources for translation works of essential and suggested readings limits these efforts. The same situation prevails for students with other Indian languages as their medium of learning. Classroom lectures are delivered in bilingual mode as per the requirement of the students. Further at the college level, we got an institutional setup in the form of ECAC such as theatre, Hindi Debate, Quizzes, programs are being organized wherein fostering Indian knowledge system is the main focus. Apart from this, various programs and seminars are held by different departments on regular basis, under the aegis of IQAC, to make the Indian knowledge system pertinent under NEP. The North-East Cell of the college organizes programmes associated with the language and culture of the region. Fairs and festivals exhibiting the art, craft and other cultural traits of different communities help in the preservation of our heritage. In the series, activities under NSS, NCC and others are being conducted in this regard.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The objectives and outcomes of education are of utmost importance in the teaching-learning process in any institution. Following these lines, Ramjas College believes in the effective Learning Outcomes- based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) introduced by UGC in July 2019, making learning student-centric, interactive and outcome-oriented with well-defined goals to achieve. In order to achieve these positive outcomes in the interests of students, all departments of the college under the aegis of Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) organize lectures, seminars/webinars, workshops and conferences to elevate the academic level and research skills. The students also participate in varieties of extracurricular activities and various games and sports events conducted in the college as well as in other institutions. These help them develop the spirit of discipline, unity and cooperation, improve physical ability and skills, and emerge as dutiful citizens. The LOCF enables students to strengthen their skills that meets future requirements in career of their interest. The Career Development Cell and the Placement Cell of the college also organizes various events to develop critical thinking and analytical approach and build up entrepreneurial spirit. For instance,

	Economics Department grants projects to students that focus on making the class room learning effective from pragmatic point of view delving on all pertinent socio-economic and political issues. The division of a class into tutorial and practical groups facilitates interaction for a better understanding of the subjects and hands-on experience. Extra classes and remedial classes, especially to help students from the marginalized sections of society, are arranged and readings for the papers are provided to students. Educational tours and field trips are also organized to encourage experimental learning to help develop problem-solving attitude and aptitude among students. Through mentor-mentee sessions students are identified and encouraged on issues in their routine, career prospects, etc., and prepare for a better future. Under, the Student-Faculty Committee (SFC), which is mandatory by Staff Council (SC), regular meetings is held by departments wherein all academic matters pertaining to teaching-learning are discussed and solutions for betterment are reached. The continuous and comprehensive evaluation system for all courses covers the activities which help wholesome development of students. This method of assessment includes presentations, assignments, projects, group discussions, etc. which enable students to realize their potential and enhance skills.
6. Distance education/online education:	To keep pace with the changes, the college has adapted to the reality, especially since the COVID-19 pandemic crisis. The platforms such as Google Classroom, Google Meet, Zoom, Internet Archive, Library Genesis, YouTube, Google earth/Google maps, virtual heritage walks etc. were used by the faculties and students for interaction and gaining information during the pandemic period. The college continues with the practice of making e-resources available to students since then. The online reading material including books, journals, etc. can be also accessed through the Delhi University Library System (DULS). With the incorporation of new technologies at present, the paper-wise internal assessment of students including evaluation of attendance, assignments, class tests, practicals, etc., uploaded on the faculty portal on the college website, is accessible to students through the student portal. The classrooms are provided with projectors and other technological set-ups which help in power-

point presentations, screening of documentaries/movies, etc. The well-maintained library of the college has an online cataloguing system which provides easy access to all the available books including rare collection and digital resources. The Braille Section houses Braille books and digital devices to serve the interests of visually challenged students. The hybrid mode of teaching-learning is facilitated by well-maintained IT infrastructure and upgraded Wi-Fi network. The online method of imparting education has not only helped the college in promoting Open and Distance Learning (ODL) for regular courses but also facilitated the organizing of several short-term courses beyond the classroom teaching. # **2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**

#### 2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

#### **Response:**

As a constituent college of University of Delhi, Ramjas College adhere to the curriculum and guidelines adopted by the university. Lectures, tutorials, practicals and internal assessment are conducted as per the academic calendar of the university. The continuous and comprehensive evaluation system for all courses includes presentations, assignments, projects, group discussions, etc. which enable students to realize their potential and enhance skills. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the students were allowed for the online submission of the assignments, projects, etc. and online presentations and quizzes were conducted for the evaluation of their progress. The college ensures the maintenance of an efficient, transparent and time-bound assessment and redressal mechanism through the following measures.

- **Teaching plan** for each paper prepared by faculties in accordance with the academic calendar enables the students to organize their study for the course. **Orientation programmes** are conducted to make students aware about the rules and regulations of assessment pattern for different papers and the feedback mechanism.
- The **division of a class into tutorial and practical groups** facilitates interaction for a better understanding of the subjects and hands-on experience. The paper-wise internal assessment of students includes evaluation of attendance, assignments, class tests, practicals, etc.
- The Academic Standard Committee, a statutory body of the college holds regular meetings to deliberate upon the matters relating to assessment and grievance redressal for students. Identifying the challenges, it recommends for the measures to reach solutions and continue with the changes in the interest of students.
- Student-Faculty Committee of each department also meets on regular basis to discuss the issues concerning classroom teaching, internal assessment of students, etc. in order to create a healthy teaching-learning environment.
- Transparency in the evaluation process is maintained through uploading the internal

assessment of each student on the college portal. All students are given a time to verify their IA score. In case of any discrepancy, they are allowed to report the same to the respective teacher within a stipulated time. After the rectifications, if required, the IA is finally uploaded on the University portal.

- Any discrepancy, such as error/s in mark-sheet, in the results of the semester end examination is resolved by the **proper guidance provided to students by teachers and the college office**. The issues failing within the purview of the college is resolved by the Examination Superintendent and the Nodal Officer for the conduct of examination at the college level. If not satisfied with the marks awarded in the paper/s, a student can apply for re-evaluation of the script/s as per the Ordinance of the University of Delhi.
- Moderation and Monitoring committee is formed, both at the department and the college level, in order to review and scrutinize the IA submitted for each paper. This is to ensure consistency, parity and uniformity in evaluation of papers within a specific course, before its uploading on the college portal.

Lectures, tutorials, and practicals are conducted as per the academic calendar of the university. Classrooms are provided with projectors and other technical gadgets to facilitate academic interaction for better outcomes. The institution ensures that its vision and mission is aptly reflected in the POs and COs for all disciplines.

- Learning outcomes are attained not only through classroom teaching but also by organizing various add-on courses, seminars, webinars, workshops, short term courses and project works, educational tours, field trips, etc. which help students to engage with experimental learning and acquire skills in various fields. For instance, under the DBT-STAR College Scheme, students have involvement in faculty-led projects which connects young minds to other institutions and industries for improving skills and other academic outcomes.
- In order to collaborate on virtual writing spaces for projects, **students and faculty are encouraged to use technologies** like MS Office, SPSS, CAS, G Suites Google Suits, and MS Teams which help the assessment methods and expedite the evaluation process.
- The **paper-wise internal assessment** of students includes evaluation of attendance, assignments, class tests, practicals, etc., which is **uploaded on the faculty portal on the college website**, **is accessible to students through the student portal**.
- The **feedback mechanism and keeping track of the students' progression** after obtaining their degree also **help us to access the POs and COs**. The college has a dedicated team that collects the feedback from students and actively maintains the data of students' progression via the placement cell.

#### **Knowledge Ecosystem**

To promote research and innovation skills among faculty members and students, unswerving efforts have been made by the college. Seminars, conferences, and workshops are organized regularly to promote the teaching-learning process. The topics and disciplines in these seminars are as varied as social anthropology, historical criticism, gender studies, cyber awareness, mental health, religion, and philosophy.

#### **Innovation and Incubation**

Ramjas College strongly believes in supporting innovations for its stakeholders. In its endeavor to create a holistic approach to address the need for nurturing ideas that could contribute to the betterment of

society, an enabling ecosystem is established. The college has spent a wholesome amount on innovationrelated activities. The Placement Cell organizes various talks by new and established entrepreneurs (including our alumni) about practical aspects of entering job industry and problems and challenges they faced in their journey. Internship Fair is organised annually to kick-start student careers and provide them with opportunities for the future. In **Enactus**, Ramjas students are involved in many projects in partnership with various Government and Non-Government organizations. Many of these projects have received national as well as international accolades and laurels. As a result, many of our students/exstudents have successfully launched their own start-ups.

Research Incubation Centers have been set up for undertaking theoretical and applied research in several departments. The college has excellent laboratories and highly qualified faculty members who undertake projects funded by agencies like DBT, DST, UGC etc. **Star College Scheme** (March 2011-2020) in departments of Botany, Chemistry, Physics and Zoology, and **Star College status** was granted to Physics and Zoology departments from 2017-2020. Fungal Biology Research Lab, Molecular Biology and Genomics Research Lab (Zoology), Medicinal Plant Research Lab (Botany), and Dr. Harsh Malhotra Research Lab have been set up in the premises. Several publications have been made in UGC-approved national and international journals. Students under teacher mentors carry out time-bound research and present their work in conferences as posters or oral presentations and also publish in reputed journals. The college has taken initiative to teach Physical Education as Generic Elective for honors courses since it's linked to good health, including higher self-esteem, fewer behavioral problems, better psychosocial engagements along with improved academic achievement.

### **Creation and Sharing of Knowledge**

The institution has practice of conducting various workshops and conferences periodically for creation and sharing of knowledge. The faculty delivers guest lectures, workshops and conferences to other institutions as part of knowledge sharing. Ramjas College promotes research and consultancy and IPRrelated culture for societal impact. Several faculty members are recognized as research supervisors and Ph.Ds have been awarded under their guidance. #### **Response:**

#### Holistic Development and Sensitization of Students

Besides academic endeavors, the college promotes extension activities to serve society and to sensitize students towards social service and responsibilities. Students enthusiastically take part in **community outreach programmes which provide hands-on experience and opportunitiues to interact with real-world issues** in order to develop them as good community citizens. The college has won applauds on several occasions for its significant contributions to community service. The **extension activities are directed towards creativity, scientific acumen and community outreach**. DST-INSPIRE Science camps, seminars/webinars and workshops are organized on regular basis to encourage and plan for the outreach-oriented service. Furthermore, college believes that energy and engagement of youth can make path breaking changes in alleviating the problems of society. Various **community outreach programmes** like gender sensitization, blood donation camps, environmental and health awareness

campaigns are conducted through the National Service Scheme, ENACTUS, Eco Club and Gender Sensitisation Committee (GSC).

#### **Institutional Initiatives**

- Our NSS Unit student volunteers engage in social service activities such as special camps in adopted villages, service to orphanages, tree plantation, yoga classes, and flood relief camps. All these programs develop a sense of responsibility, accountability, integrity and human values. Other programmes organised by the Unit include literacy classes for children of weaker sections, leadership workshops, awareness programmes, Diwali Mela, Swacchta Pakhwada, cleanliness campaigns, nukkad natak, blood donation, debate competitions on social issues, donation drive, self defence training, disaster management training, webinars related to the growth and development of society, etc.
- **Community and environmental conservation events** such as International Peace Day, Seeding Awareness, Plantation Drive and Holistic Wellness workshops are also organised under the NSS.
- Several ongoing projects are underway through the initiatives of NSS. **Project Samvriddhi** and **Navannamardhan** aim at providing educational support to the underprivileged through workshops, literacy classes and skills-based knowledge, as well as celebrating events with children in the downtrodden areas. **Project Parivesh** is an environmental protection programme which enables spread of awareness regarding conservation and ecology. **Project Sashakt** is for the upgradation and provision of educational materials for differently abled individuals. **Project Indradhanush** aims at spreading awareness regarding diseases, healthcare and vaccines.
- Students also participate actively in outreach activities, such as the 'Unnat Bharat Abhiyan', which creates awareness and sensitivity towards the underprivileged sections of society and understand real-life situations.
- The college organized a cleanliness drive under 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyan'. The main purpose of this campaign was to create awareness about hygiene and its impact on health.
- Mental health awareness workshops have been organised on important issues like mental health literacy, managing anxiety, sleep problems, examination stress, developing gratitude, empathic communication, personal and social trauma like riots, COVID-19, etc.
- **ENACTUS Ramjas** participated in the Enactus World Cup (EWC) 2022 where we showcased our entrepreneurial skills and innovative ideas.

# 4.1.1

#### **Response:**

The college offers state-of-the-art infrastructure that ensures the academic and co-curricular progress of its students.

#### Academic assistance:

- The institution offers two cutting-edge seminar halls, a conference room and one board room with modern ICT infrastructure.
- Multiple lush green lawns for student's excursion and a Wi-Fi connected campus.
- Multi-storied building houses well-lit and ventilated classrooms with seating capacity of approximately 100 students and LCD projectors that aids in ICT learning.
- The library is fully automated by TROODON software and comprises vast collection of books. A subscription to the DULS Network, which includes the N-List Database to make e-journals and e-books available to members.
- To inculcate the scientific and experimental skills each department has multiple well-sourced laboratories.
- A few departments like Botany, Chemistry and Zoology have set up fully operational Research Labs that makes students enthusiastic to carry out research interests.
- Physics Department has its own workshop where the instruments can be customized and repaired by the Lab staff.

#### Administration and other amenities:

One fully equipped main staffroom with locker facilities, departmental staff rooms and teachers room for science departments.

- LAN-enabled office staff cabins, reception desk and visitor's room.
- Canteen, photocopy shop, ATM, RO water plant, rainwater harvesting plant, clean energy-solar plant and a generator, Vermi -composting Unit and a herbal garden.
- Medical room with a first-aid facility and Student's Counselor
- Girls' common room with a sanitary pad vending machine
- Well maintained boy's and girl's hostel with the capacity of 104 boys and 80 girls. Both the hostels have large dining hall, kitchen, common room and arrangements for indoor and outdoor

games.

- Residential facilities for teaching and non-teaching staff along with Principal's residence.
- Range of facilities for differently-abled students such as tactile paving, Braille signage's, lifts, ramps and, washrooms with handles, wheelchair and audio aids are made available.
- A large parking area for students and staff.
- Separate space for SC/ST Cell and Women Development Cell to tackle social justice and gender sensitive issues.

#### Safety and Security

- There are many exits on every building block to make it easier to evacuate in the event of an accident.
- According to fire safety laws and standards, fire hydrants, fire alarms and firefighting equipment are installed at various locations.
- To maintain safety and prevent theft, CCTV cameras are installed in majority of the labs, parking gates, and corridors.
- Security guards are present at all entrance points.

#### Sports and extracurricular activities:

- The College boats of possessing one of the largest sports ground in University of Delhi.
- The Sports facilities include Archery, Athletics, Basketball, Badminton, Chess, Football, Judo, Netball, Table-Tennis, Taekwondo, Volleyball, Shooting, fully functional Gym, Physiotherapy and Rehabilitation centre.
- A newly constructed fully air condition Shooting range (10 meter Air pistol & rifle), new volleyball court especially for girls.
- The auditorium of college has state- of- art facility with a seating capacity of 500 persons.

National Cadet Corps (NCC) of college has 34 cadets with dedicated space to conduct meetings, rooms for changing and storing uniforms and trunks that hold miscellaneous items used for NCC activities.

# 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

### 4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

#### **Response:**

- Ramjas college was the first institution in the University of Delhi to adopt automation of Library (since 2000) with vast collection of books.
- The ILMS software used for automation is **TROODON version 3.0.** This software has different modules like acquisition, maintenance, circulation, serials, online public access catalogue (OPAC) kiosk that helps to search and locate the books in library. It also alerts students via reminder SMS for book return .This software supports **Devanagri** and other Indian languages.
- It is fully **air conditioned** and **Wi-fi enabled**. The Entry register is kept at main entrance to record the daily attendance of the students and teachers separately.
- The library has provision of different seating areas for students and faculty with **desktop facility**
- The library gives an access to **"DrillBit**" software to check the plagiarism of document.
- The Library has The Constitution of India put on display for easy access to students and staff.
- The college library has a rich collection of more than 1,33,585 books. It also has rare book collection section of old books that are no more available in markets. It subscribes to 18 newspapers and several magazines.
- A collection of science books includes books on subjects such as botany, zoology, physics, chemistry, electronics, anthropology, life sciences, physical sciences, and geology. It also contains a comprehensive collection of academic and supplementary texts for Humanities subjects such as English, Hindi, Sanskrit, History, Economics, and Philosophy.
- Apart from the in-house collection, the library has full access to thousands of journals online through N-LIST databases. N-list is a comprehensive database where users of Ramjas College can access more than 6000+ e-journals, 199500 e-books through the National Digital Library. It covers all the disciplines i.e., Pure Science, Social Sciences and Humanities Including

Languages and Linguistics.

- Library has subscription to **LEX** software from University of Delhi that allows students to covert e-books to pdf which can be downloaded for study material.
- To facilitate access to adequate learning resources for people with **print disabilities**, the library provides Barile books / dictionaries and Braile desktop computers.
- To ensure ease of accessibility, visually challenged students are provided with recording devices, ANGEL to record their lectures.
- The average annual expenditure on books and journals for the last 5 years has been Rs.7,84.969.60/-
- Approximately **365 unique users** have accessed the **N-LIST**. The average **daily footfall count** in the library is approximate **308**. The Library is **optimally used by teachers and students**.
- One of the future expansion programmes of the library is to update the complete automation of library usage enabling self-check-in and check-out with the help of an Electronic Security Gate.

#### **Response:**

The provision of IT facilities is fundamental for both the student body and faculty. Such amenities encompass computer labs, internet access, printing services, and an array of software applications. The faculty members utilize these resources to develop curriculum, conduct research, and execute administrative duties. Conversely, students rely on these facilities to fulfill academic obligations, research pertinent topics, and engage with professors and fellow students. Altogether, the IT facilities offered by Ramjas College are crucial components for the academic prosperity of both faculty and students, and for the efficient functioning of the institution.

- The IT infrastructure is a necessity for almost all administrative tasks. The college has Wi-Fi internet facility. College is connected to National Knowledge Network (NKN) internet connectivity through direct connectivity of 10 Gbps backbone and 1Gbps uplink ports from University of Delhi.
- The college has facilitated 1345 laptops and 56 desktop computers with internet connection for

students, teachers and administrative staff in the college office, library, staff room, department rooms, etc.

- The college has installed a total of 37 projectors across classrooms, computer labs, various departmental labs, the seminar hall, and the conference room. Additionally, LAN facilities are available in several locations throughout the college.
- The college library and computer labs offer access to electronic resources such as DULS (Delhi University Library System) to all staff and students. Additionally, the institution utilizes its N-LIST (INFLIBNET) subscription. Furthermore, the library is equipped with LEX and SARA software, both of which are furnished by Delhi University.
- The college has installed a pair of LCD infrared optical interactive panels in both the Principal's board room and the seminar room.
- The operations of the college library are seamlessly automated through the utilization of Troodon software, resulting in efficient management of data and timely issuing and reissuing of books. Additionally, the library employs an online public access catalogue (OPAC) to enhance accessibility and facilitate book searches for the faculty staff and students.
- To enhance accessibility for visually impaired students, the college provides recording devices such as the Angel to enable them to record lectures with ease. Additionally, the college library offers JAWS software, which enables screen reading and is readily available for use by visually impaired users.
- The college office employs a proprietary software solution developed in-house to facilitate its internal assessment process and streamline college administration activities. Additionally, the accounts section utilizes a suite of sophisticated software tools such as Tally, Pension, Payroll, and Fees software to effectively manage and administer the financial aspects of the institution.
- The computer laboratories are equipped with a selection of both paid and freely available software. The former includes reputable programs such as MS Office, MS Windows, and Mathematica, while the latter includes a broad range of powerful tools such as Scilab, Python, Tex Maker, Phy Chem, Tora QGIS 4, Tally Prime, Chem Sketch, Code Block, Argus Lab, Tex Works, R, PC Basics, R studio, and Clustal X.
- College also provides laptops to staff members for off-campus usage to conduct their research work and administrative tasks.

# 6.3 <u>Faculty Empowerment Strategies</u>

## 6.3.1

#### **Response:**

Ramjas College is committed for the welfare of its teaching and non-teaching staff. The facility of pension scheme available to the employees ensures their security and protection after retirement from service. The employees are also encouraged to update their knowledge through various workshops and training programmes. The feedback and appraisal mechanism adopted by the college helps in assessment of the work and future planning. The following measures followed in this regard are noteworthy.

- In order to ensure unprejudiced and timely promotion of employees, the College follows the Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) as per UGC regulations. The Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) smoothen and rationalize the process of promotion of teaching staff through assessment of different segments such as teaching and learning, professional development, co-curricular and extension activities, research, publication and academic contribution.
- The **Ward Quota facility for the admission** to the wards of teaching as well as non-teaching staff is followed as per the Delhi University rules.
- The College also provides educational allowance to the wards of the employees under the Children Education Allowance (CEA) for supporting the schooling and hostel facilities of their children.
- The staff also avail the **medical facility for themselves as well as their dependents**. They are **entitled to claim the reimbursement of the expenditure** incurred on medical treatment from authorized medical practitioners and the **hospitals on the panel of Delhi University** for the said purpose. **Cashless service** is also available in certain empaneled hospitals as listed by the university wherein the hospital collects the amount for treatment directly from the college.
- The college ensures a guaranteed income and a secure future of the employees towards the

contribution for savings under the Old Pension Scheme (OPS) and New Pension Scheme (NPS) for protecting their interest in post-retirement phase of life.

- The college also **provides well-furnished accommodation in limited number to the teaching and non-teaching employees** within the campus. The lush green trees and the pollution-free atmosphere **facilitates a healthy stay and improved quality of life** for the residents.
- The employees can also avail the benefits of Leave Travel Concession (LTC) and Home Travel Concession (HTC) as per the government rules for traveling within the country during their leave period and visiting hometown.
- The college maintains a healthy work environment to achieve optimum efficiency at work and proper utilization of resources. Facilities such as air-conditioned staff rooms, administrative wing and committee rooms; a well-furnished kitchenette within the staff room and the college canteen serve as important spaces beyond the classrooms.

# 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

#### 6.4.1

#### **Response:**

Ramjas College ensures proper utilization of resources and grants from various government/nongovernment agencies. The financial records are audited in order to maintain fairness and transparency in the financial management of the institution. The regularly conducted audits also reflect our financial position and performance that further helps in planning for our future objectives and strengthening the faith of our stakeholders in the governance of the college. The following important measures help us to continue with efficient resource mobilization and its usage.

- The internal and external financial audits are conducted on a regular basis. The college follows the regulations and guidelines for financial management and procurement laid down by the General Finance Rules (GFR) of the Government of India. Annual Accounts and Budget Estimates are prepared for every financial year according to the guidelines of the University of Delhi.
- All **purchases for the college are initiated through Government E-Marketplace (GeM)**. In case the products/services are not available on GeM, the same is procured through market survey. This brings transparency in the purchase process.
- The college follows **online transaction with regard to the payment of fee, other kind of receipts and disbursements**. This not only ensures fairness but also save time resulting in the people's satisfaction with the system.
- The Accounts Department of the college maintains the financial statements including the records of receipts and expenditure with the highest professional accounting standards. Records are systematically maintained for grants received from different government

organizations, NGOs, autonomous organizations, and individuals etc. for efficient mobilization and utilization of resources.

- Being a constituent college of the University of Delhi, **the internal audit is conducted by the University** which examines the financial management procedures followed by the institution and locate the factors for further improvement in the system.
- The external audit of the financial statements and accounts is conducted by the Auditors from the office of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG). This is a mandatory process to be followed for proper management of accounts. Any audit objection is responded with utmost care, supportive evidence and justified reasoning.
- All financial matters are placed before the Governing Body for the final approval. The Principal, Bursar, Administrative Officer and the Section Officer (Accounts) in coordination maintain accountability with respect to the financial management in the college.
- After the approval of the budget and grant by the Governing Body, the **allocation of funds to each department, society, cell and committee is in accordance with their requirements** for academic, administrative, infrastructural developments.
- The practice of a sound principles of financial management at the college helps in the **proper utilization of grants and avoiding non-essential expenditures**. This further helps in **timely disbursement of salary and other benefits to employees**. The **Provident Fund accounts** and other financial records are **meticulously maintained by the Accounts Department** in order to provide a comfortable and safe future for the employees after their retirement from the service.

#### **BEST PRACTICE 1: SOLAR ENERGY**

### **OBJECTIVE:**

Solar energy is environmentally friendly, pollution free and a clean source of electricity. It has no negative impact on the environment. Solar power plant requires clear water to operate and produces no greenhouse gases.

Following are some objectives of solar energy:

1. Decreases usage of non-renewable energy: Solar energy is sustainable, inexhaustible, non-polluting and reliable source of energy and hence decreases the utilization of non-renewable energy resources.

2. Deals with the problem of global warming: Solar energy diminishes our need for fossil fuels. Also, solar energy has lower emission than other sources of electricity such as coal and hence reduces global warming significantly.

3. Economical: Solar panels reduce our dependence on the main energy grid which reduces electricity bills.

#### THE PRACTICE:

Ramjas College is adamantly committed towards creating an eco-friendly and sustainable campus. A 312.84 KWP solar PV project was installed on the college rooftop and has been operational since 6th December 2019.

#### **EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS:**

- Reduction in electricity bill: The college generated 337608 units in the last financial year and generated Rs 10,49,960/- approximately.
- Reduced carbon footprint: The college has put in efforts to reduce carbon footprints inside the campus and discourages the use of plastic.

#### PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED:

Dust, high temperatures and the dearth of water are contributing to a significant increase in the cost of operating solar power plants.

- Skill Labour: A labour force with the necessary skills is required for maintenance and cleaning. As a consequence of all of this, operational costs will increase.
- Sunny areas required: The generation of solar energy is limited to those locations that are exposed to a significant amount of daylight.

# **BEST PRACTICE 2: WASTE MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVE:**

To cut down on the number of natural resources that are used up, reuse the materials that are harvested from the natural world as much as is feasible, and generate as little trash as is humanly possible. Feedback loops, a focus on processes, embodiment of adaptability, and waste diversion from disposal should all be included in an effective and sustainable waste management system.

#### THE CONTEXT:

The term "waste management" refers to the process of collecting, transporting, processing or disposing of various waste items as well as managing and monitoring such processes. Paper, plastics, glass, metals, foods, and other types

of debris are among the things that fall into the category of garbage that is produced as a by-product of the various activities that are carried out on a routine basis in the college. Systems for the management of waste are developed with the goals of preserving the environment and making the conditions around us better.

#### Solid Waste Management

Separation of Biodegradable and Non-Biodegradable waste separately:

- There is a provision of BLUE-GREEN covered-pushed dustbins provided at each floor.
- Compost Pits are utilized by the college in order to combat the issue of solid waste. These pits consist of a hole that has been dug, which is then stuffed with organic waste and topped with grass clippings or leaves.

#### Liquid Waste Management

Laboratory wastewater treatment plant

- To treat waste water coming out from the laboratories of the Department of Chemistry.
- The laboratories waste water which mainly consists of acidic impurities, gets collected in the first part of the tank first.
- The tank consists of three parts, water gets collected in the first part, where sedimentation takes place, then the water passes in the second tank, which has calcium carbonate pebbles, so that neutralization takes place, after which water passes through third part of the tank, where it gets stored and occasionally the pH of the water is checked by the laboratory staff.
- Once it is close to neutral, it is discharged into the main sewer tank line of the college.

#### Water Recycling

- An initiative has been taken to increase the water level by replenishing the existing borewell by means of rain water harvesting.
- In the first part, sedimentation takes place, and the water passes to the second part, where further decantation takes place and then it is discharged into the borewell, which is 40-50 feet deep. This helps in replenishing sub-soil water.

#### Waste-Reuse Reuse of Iron

- Conserves Natural Resources: Recycling helps to conserve the natural resources that are becoming increasingly scarce. Recycling allows for the utilisation of previously mined metals, which eliminates the need to conduct extensive drilling and the subsequent collection of new base metals. Recycling even helps to cutdown on the amount of water that would otherwise be used in the production of the materials from scratch.
- Slow Landfill Growth: By recycling materials that are already in existence, we can keep them out of landfills.

#### **Reuse of Bricks**

- Bricks can be reused and recycled, which cuts down on the amount of waste that ends up in landfills. This, in turn, lowers the amount of greenhouse gas emissions, which is an important step in the fight against the factors that contribute to climate change.
- Saving energy that would have been used to process landfills is one of the benefits of recycling bricks.
- When there is no new brick production, there is a reduction in the amount of water used.
- In Perth, waste from demolition makes up fifty percent of the waste that is thrown away in landfills. Bricks can be recycled into usable material, which reduces the amount of waste produced.

#### **EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS:**

The waste from the floor bins is collected in movable containers or dustbins that have been provided for each block, and then it is taken to the dumping yard. Bricks and repurposed iron have been used in the construction of the college's staircases, railings, and gates.

#### **PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED:**

• Segregating waste and the lack of awareness over segregation.

• The success of such practices requires attitude and willingness on the part of the facilitator without which it is difficult to motivate students, which is the target audience of the college.

#### INSTITUTIONAL DISTINCTIVENESS

The student information services (SIS) system is an important innovation introduced in the college to facilitate better management of information and data relating to academics and general administration. It is accessible through the college website www.ramjas.du.ac.in. All academic and administrative data relating to students are uploaded, stored, processed, and retrieved through the dedicated software that

runs SIS. From tutorial management to term wise attendance, from midterm marks to assignment grades, from back-end reports to all important information (like teaching plans, important

dates, notices etc.), SIS is primary driver for information management in Ramjas. The dedicated staff of the college help in keeping the system updated with the latest information about the university admission, examination, teaching-learning activities, extra-curricular activities, seminars, workshops, celebrations, etc. Students and Faculty are actively encouraged to use SIS on a regular basis.

#### **Evolution of the SIS**

With the purpose of managing, securing and tracking students' data in an efficient way and in a secure environment, Ramjas college realized the potential of the technology and has utilised it for the last two decades to fulfil its objectives.

In 2003, the Governing Body of Ramjas College designed an execution plan to introduce the Student Information Services (SIS) System with step-by-step upgradation and introduction of various services under the SIS.

In 2005, the college contracted M/s Computer Vibes to build the same, but later switched to M/s Pathfinder eSolutions Pvt. Ltd. for their expertise in developing and installing the software. The latter organisation proved to be capable and competent in successfully developing and installing the software which matched the benchmark of some of the best educational management software.

With the enlargement of the data and increase in the maintenance cost due to the escalating price of new software/equipment posed new challenges to the management and expansion of the SIS. Introduction of new syllabi and the need of

managing admission through online process, however, motivated the college to refine the SIS in accordance with the new requirements. Keeping its pace with the introduction of various online services by the DUCC, the college regularly added new services to the SIS system. By the end of 2014, the college was equipped with an up-to-date virtual platform with desired online services.

In 2014-15, Ramjas College implemented a cloud-based ERP and developed a mobile app to enhance connectivity. Its prime objective was to manage the data effectively and efficiently in such a way that it can be accessed anytime from

anywhere by the users. The college also migrated its website to a new domain, making it dynamic and easily accessible. In 2017-18, the college customized the SIS based on the University of Delhi's base platform, integrating various administrative and service-related activities.

It was fully customized in accordance with the college specific requirements which enabled the college to hold a self-maintained and user-friendly student information services system. An eco-friendly, paperless, efficient and convenient platform was, thus, established to manage the data of the college in a secure and efficient way. With continuous evolution of the system based on requirements, Ramjas college at present has a very informative, efficiently manageable, user-friendly and vibrant student information services system. The vision of the college has earned a place among institutions which maintain a vast, extensive and a large-scale student information services system facilitated with latest technological integration.

#### **Features of the SIS:**

#### Login and Dashboard

#### Login

SIS is accessible through the college website www.ramjas.du.ac.in. Whereas the website carries a host of information on the college, the login option for SIS is restricted to students, staff and the administration

#### of the college.

#### Dashboard

After login the user of the SIS is presented with a panel/dashboard based on the role i.e. student, faculty etc. The dashboard has information elements and several cards through which the user can navigate to the various modules available via the system.

Common Modules - Faculty and Student

#### Time-table

This module displays the course wise and faculty wise time-table.

#### **Teaching Plan**

Through this module the Faculty members share the teaching plan for the various papers they teach. The students can view the teaching plan as it is made available via their dashboard.

#### Attendance

This module allows the Faculty to upload the monthly attendance for the students for the Papers they teach. There is a separate section for Faculty to add the Papers (Theory, Tutorial and Practical) that they teach. The students dashboard allows the students to view their attendance across the various papers for their Course.

#### Assignment

This module is for assignment management, the faculty can give assignments and the students can upload their completed assignments via this module.

#### **Internal Assessment**

This module allows the faculty to grade the students for their internal assessment incorporating elements like attendance, assignment marks, class performance etc.

#### **Discussion Forums**

The discussion forums are used by both faculty and student alike to interact for discussions around the subject as well as seek support from a wider community.

#### **E-learning**

Through this module the faculty can provide e-learning content to the students for offline/hybrid learning.

#### Profile

Students and Faculty can keep their profile information updated via this module.

#### Faculty Modules

#### Report

The faculty specific module include Reports such as "GE / SEC / VAC Paper Reports" etc which indicate the number of students who have opted for the various courses offered by the different departments.

#### **Student Modules**

The student specific modules include:

#### **Student Forms**

The forms are open for student input at specified times during the academic year that allows the students to opt for the courses of their choice among GE/VAC/SEC etc.

#### News

Various notices, schemes, information about activities, workshops etc are transmitted to the students via the news section.

Fees

The students can view their fees paid and due via this module. They also have the ability to pay their fees online and print receipts for past fees paid. **Scholarship** 

Students can apply for financial aid and assistance through this module.

#### Placement

The placement module provides students with placement related news and support to the students to aid in their placement.
